
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From the Headteacher

Happy New Year everyone! Our term started with an assembly about how we act and are perceived. Are we 'radiators' or 'drains'? Do we ooze warmth and positivity or do we drain the energy out of others with negativity by moaning and groaning? Are we like Buzz Lightyear or Eeyore? I have to admit that this topic initiated some great discussions during that week!



We have also reminded the children about healthy eating and the importance of exercise in an assembly led by Mrs Langdale when she introduced the Change4Life campaign. We discussed easy sugar swaps to make our diets healthier. Families can sign up to the Change4Life campaign at <https://www.nhs.uk/change4life> where you can find meal ideas, helpful tips, food swap ideas and also download the helpful 'Food Scanner' app.

STAR POINTS - On the 11th it was great to celebrate our STAR Point achievements from last term. Those children who earned 100 STAR Points were rewarded with an afternoon disco. They loved it! The success of this event has led to some parents asking for an explanation as to what the children need to do to earn STAR Points so that their child has the opportunity of reaching the magical 100 in the future. Therefore, for clarification, STAR Points are linked to the school rules, children earn:

- S points for **S**elf-control
- T points for **T**aking responsibility
- A points for **A**lways following instructions
- R points for showing **R**espect

They are also awarded for being helpful and kind, showing great effort in learning, for using the 4Rs effectively in their learning and for the number of reads they do each week as recorded in their reading record/planner (although this must be signed off by a parent). We will award STAR Points for different things in different year groups, for example, we will reward for great sitting and listening for our younger children, but not for the older ones. Equally, there are some children to whom learning comes more easily than others – thus we reward for EFFORT. Some of the brightest children will not earn a STAR Point unless we have seen that they have worked hard, remained focussed and exhibited great learning powers. I hope this explanation is useful and I look forward to seeing even more children at the next disco.

Thank you the numerous emails of support I have received this week following my message about directing emails via me instead of to the teachers. This new policy is working well and this has significantly eased the workload of the teachers who now have more time to plan the best lessons possible for your children.

Finally, please note my recent letter about the Friends of Langshott EGM on **Wednesday 27th February at 6.30pm**. I hope to see as many of you there as possible.



NSPCC Assembly and Pants Rule

On Tuesday 29th January all the children heard an assembly called "Speak out. Stay safe", delivered by a visitor from the charity NSPCC. Please look out for the maths activity that was introduced at the assembly and the explanation letter to support Number Day on Friday. Please support the NSPCC if you can. It is all of our jobs to keep our children safe from maltreatment, but how and what should parents say about sexual abuse without frightening their children? Children's charity, the NSPCC, encourages "Talking Pants" as one way for parents to talk about sexual abuse. "Parents shouldn't leave it up to teachers," says Jon Brown, head of the NSPCC's sexual abuse policy. The risks are real and parents should have "simple conversations" with their children from the age of five right through to adulthood, he says, adding that "children who have the words to speak are less likely to be abused". "Bath-time, walking home from school or in the car are all opportunities to have that first talk. Avoid scary words, but say that their body belongs to them and that they can say no if someone tries to touch them."



Dr Nina Burrowes, a psychologist who specialises in child sexual abuse, says parents often cling to the "myth of stranger danger" and teach their children to be wary of people they don't know, but "what if the perpetrator is someone they do know?" she says. The most common form of abuse comes from within the family and it can come from someone who is well-known and trusted in the community. She says parents should talk about sexual abuse in the same way they teach their children about bad behaviour. Introduce the subject by saying "can I talk to you about this - because it's important to me?". Approach the conversation in the same way you would teach children how to play with others and explain where it is ok to touch people. Tell them the difference between a "good secret" - like a surprise party - and a "bad secret" - one which you can never tell anyone.

Talking Pants - The message "keep your pants private" may be something that sounds familiar to parents of primary school-age children. The NSPCC's Talking Pants campaign uses the message:

- P - Privates are private
- A - Always remember that your body belongs to you
- N - No means no
- T - Talk about secrets that upset you
- S - Speak up, someone can help

Parking

A plea to all parents and carers dropping off and collecting their children both for school and for Crystal Club to please park sensibly. Do not park vehicles within the yellow lined boxed area near the main blue gates, nor on the yellow lines. Parking in this area creates an unnecessary hazard and puts the safety of both the children and other pedestrians at risk. A reminder too, that you cannot use the Oakwood Sports Centre car park (unless you are a member) or the Oakwood School car park on the Balcombe Road.

We know that parking is difficult, as it is around any school. Most of our parents live locally and we urge as many of you as possible to walk, cycle or scoot. If you have to drive, Reigate & Banstead Council have provided us with some parking permits for the High Street Car Park in Horley Town Centre during drop off and pick up times. Abusive Behaviour On Site

We have had two nasty incidents recently where parents have become abusive towards other parents or staff because of poor parking. This is a reminder that we do not tolerate parents shouting, swearing or being abusive on the site for any reason. It can be very disruptive and distressing and does not set a good example. As the Head, I can invoke Section 547 of the Education Act 1996 and ban abusive parents from coming onto the school site, this includes the car park.
