From the Headteacher

As the weather begins to get really quite cold, we are all conscious of our energy needs, as well as the wider cost of living crisis. These are concerning times for many and there is a lot of pressure on our finances. The school is no different. Costs are rising and already stretched budgets are under more pressure. You will have seen the letter from Mrs Mackintosh recently outlining some measures that are having to be put in place, such as the cancelling of the AstroTurf project. Please be assured that there is a strong finance foundation within the senior leadership team and they are very proactive in tackling the budgetary issues. The Governing Body of course supports them where necessary. We also have a dedicated finance committee with extensive financial background who are able to scrutinise, and challenge, the decisions that are being made. Every decision is made with the children as the priority.







On a more positive note, the school's Christmas preparations are moving into top gear. I was fortunate enough to be able to watch the Christingle performance with Years 5 and 6, which was a very enjoyable afternoon. From the Governing Body, we wish you a merry Christmas and a very happy new year!

Cultural Capital - Our Vision for Langshott

From Reception to Year 6, the Langshott curriculum builds upon experiences, skills and knowledge, as children journey through the school. We plan our broad and balanced curriculum carefully to ensure children have progressive rich opportunities. Further to this, Langshott Primary School pupils benefit from introduction to cultures around the world and situations in which they might not have previously experienced. Therefore, they are able to draw upon decision making skills, awareness of society and understanding of the world around them to be successful in society and the world of work. We believe this to be of paramount importance to their ongoing life and journey.

Langshott Primary School recognises 6 key areas for development that contribute to pupils' cultural capital as being:

-  **Personal development:** citizenship, transition support, pastoral support, inc. ELSA, growth mindset encouragement, wellbeing opportunities, showcasing talent opportunities such as year group assemblies and local events (dance festival, young voices), residential trips for Years 4 and 6 and a variety of children's leadership opportunities across all faculties.
-  **Social development including political and current affair awareness:** charity events such as harvest, in class reflection time, assemblies, school council across all year groups, watching Newsround, local community participation such as remembrance/carnival and children's leadership opportunities across all faculties.
-  **Physical development:** anti bullying accreditation, healthy eating policy and health week, a broad and balance PE curriculum, extra-curricular activities (from both internal and external providers), activity based residential trips for Years 4 and 6, Bikeability, forest school, celebration of sports through sports week and PE class of the week, the weekly Langshott lap, promotion of walking and cycling to school and a wide range of lunch time equipment and apparatus.
-  **Spiritual development:** a broad and balanced religious education, acts of reflection, support to express individual faiths, Christmas nativity performances and acts of religion such as Christingle led by a local minister, assemblies to reflect different cultures and faith.
-  **Moral development:** a broad and balanced religious education curriculum, behaviour policy underpinned by the British values, STARS rules followed by consistent reward or sanction, contribution to charitable projects such as the foodbank during harvest, a progressive PSHE curriculum with wide opportunity for reflection on gender, race and sex.
-  **Cultural development:** junior citizenship education in Year 5, access to arts such as music and art for exploration of different cultures, access to language (Spanish lessons in KS2), use of BSL in collective times, a well-structured History curriculum to support understanding of how history shaped our lives and children's leadership opportunities through our Global ambassadors.

Breck Foundation

We are lucky enough to have booked the Breck Foundation to come in on Tuesday 28th March to speak with the children about how to stay safe online. There will also be a Zoom session that evening for parents to login to and find out what the children learnt. More information will be shared nearer the time.



Year 1

The Year 1 children had a fantastic time at the British Wildlife Centre. It linked strongly to our 'animals' topic and really enhanced the children's learning. The children learnt about a variety of animals, including their diets (herbivores, carnivores and omnivores) and habitats. It was a wonderful day out and they all came back with smiling faces and more knowledge about animals than they had before. Year 2

In our Year 2 science lessons, we investigated everyday materials. The children identified and compared the suitability of a variety of materials and what they could be used for. The materials investigated included wood, metal, plastic, glass, brick, rock, paper and cardboard. They gathered and recorded data confidently. Using this knowledge, the children created a poster promoting a material of choice.



Year 3 Rocks Workshop

We were very lucky to start our term off with an exciting workshop learning all about rocks! To deepen our knowledge and understanding on different types of rocks, their properties and where we might find them, we were joined by a local Geologist who brought in a huge selection for us to explore! Rhino Readers - EYFS & KS1 Update

We have had lots of positive feedback about the new Twinkl Phonics scheme that was implemented in September. We are impressed with the impact it is having so far and would like to take this opportunity to thank you for all of the support and feedback we have had.

Caring for Books

The school recently purchased a large number of books that runs alongside the Twinkl Phonics scheme to support children with their reading. **Please ensure your child looks after their book.**

They should not tear or crease the pages, bend the spines or deface the pages by drawing or writing on them. We need your support to ensure that every child is able to benefit in the long term.

Lost or Damaged Books

We understand that accidents happen and it is especially easy for water bottles to open in book bags. However, due to the cost involved in purchasing and replacing these books, we kindly ask parents/carers to ensure your children are careful when using the books at home or transporting them to and from school. Regrettably, if books are damaged at home, we will ask you to pay for a replacement. If a book is lost, children will not be allocated a new book until the one is returned or paid for. Charges of £5 for any lost or damaged books will be made and go towards replacing the book. If a lost book is subsequently found, and is in good condition, your payment will be refunded. To help, we have just purchased plastic zip wallets to transport the books. We hope this will help to keep the books in tiptop condition so that we can continue to provide quality books for years to come.

Reading is at the heart of everything we do at Langshott and we want to ensure all children receive quality books. Thank you for your understanding and continued support.

Year 4 Iron Man

News from the Global Understanding & Awareness Faculty

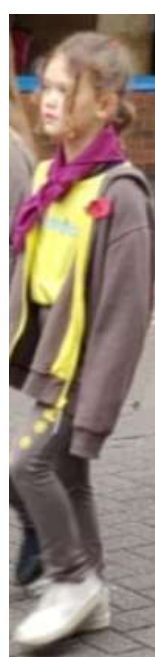

RE Christmas Week

With Christmas in the air, Langshott have had a magical week exploring the Christmas story and its deeper meaning in lots of practical, fun-filled and interesting ways. Early years looked at festivals and celebrations and talked about important events in our lives – a lovely way to begin their Religious Education journey.

Year 1 investigated the nativity story and recreated the events through a superb puppet show using felt puppets that they cleverly created themselves. Year 2 delved a little deeper, looking at the symbolism and meaning of some of the clues in the Christmas story – such as the star and gifts given by the wise men. Their final piece was an artistic lift and flap picture.

The Year 3 classes looked at the meaning of gifts given at Christmas time and in the spirit of giving, presented thoughtful ideas of ways to give at Christmas which do not involve money (a very timely topic).

Looking at various forms of Art, Year 4 compared how different artists present the events of Christmas, finally making their own stunning stained glass windows using coloured cellophane – these are beautifully displayed in their classroom windows.

With a modern twist, Year 5 spent time researching different ways that the nativity story is recorded in the Bible and used technology to write an email of how the Good news might be spread today. They were entertaining and very creative and I daresay we had a few future journalists in the making!

It was a real delight having a local Pastor, Tim Hill, in to teach Year 6 about the symbolism of the Christingle as they learned about light vs dark at Christmas time. Pastor Hill even conducted our very first Christingle service where the children got to light the Christingles they had made and sing some lively songs they had been practising. This was greatly enjoyed by parents of Year 6 and children alike – what a treat!

Forest School News

As the second half of the Autumn term began, both Reception and Year 4 donned their wellies and waterproofs and braved the driving rain, showing amazing resilience. They were rewarded with plenty of jumping in muddy puddles, much to their enjoyment!

Reception learnt the Forest School rules to keep themselves safe in the woodland and were even lucky enough to hear the legend of the 'Langshott Little People' who live in the Forest School area. Ask your child to tell you the story of the Fire Dragon and how Reception helped to rebuild the Langshott Little People's homes and made them a muddy tea party! The children also enjoyed role-playing in the hammocks and woodland shelters and even collected different types of firewood, which we then used to make a fire and toast marshmallows, supported by some of our older Forest School leaders and champions.



Year 4 were able to make excellent links between their classroom learning and their Forest School adventures. They built their own 'Timber Man' in the style of 'Iron Man' from their class book. They learnt about and 'celebrated differences' between the different trees in the forest and linked this to their PSHE learning about celebrating differences within a community. In Science, the children had been studying Electricity, therefore they went on a treasure hunt for different electrical components that had been hidden in the woodland and then used sticks to represent wire to create a giant electrical circuit diagram. As well as this, they practised their knot-tying skills to create some natural festive decorations. We were also fortunate enough to benefit from a delivery of free saplings from The Woodland Trust, which Mr Humphries and the Year 4 Forest School leaders planted to create a natural hedge boundary along one side of the Forest School area.

After the Christmas holidays, it will be the turn of Year 3, Year 5 and Year 6 to explore our frosty Forest School world. Look out for a separate letter with further details (and make sure they pack their hats and gloves)!

PE

Reception – Reception children have enjoyed lots of fun PE sessions with Miss Boardman this half term. As well as learning the fundamentals of how to find space, stopping, and starting safely, they have explored Langshott's "magical sweet factory", weaving their way in and out of the candy canes, jumping over gumdrops and balancing on a licorice tightrope. They also pretended to be different modes of transport, such as bicycle, car, train and aeroplane while we played games around these themes.

Year 1 - Children in Year 1 have really improved their ball handling skills, including their catching and throwing. As a year group, their chest passes and bounce passes are looking really good and they are also working together well with partners and small groups using their reciprocity skills. We have focussed on invasion games this term and the children now understand the notion of defending and attacking during these different types of sports.

Year 2 – It has been a great half term for Year 2 who have taken their understanding of invasion games to another level. We even had a chance to play mini games of netball, basketball and football to deepen their understanding of what they have learnt so far. All the children really got involved and enjoyed this extra challenge!

Year 3 - They have been very impressive with how quickly they have picked up netball this term. It has been great to see them develop their understanding of the rules, improve their netball skills, as well as working together as a team and encouraging each other. Year 3 have used all these skills to play mini netball matches against each other and it has been amazing to see their progress this half term.

Year 4 – It has been exciting to see how much they have improved their netball skills this half term. During the term, we have been working on "positions" and some strategy in games and the children have really risen to the challenge. As well as stressing the importance of defending "in the circle", Year 4s have also worked on spacing and communicating with teammates. It has been heartening to see them putting their learning powers into practise during these games, particularly resilience and reciprocity.

Year 5 - They seem to be loving basketball this term and have really improved since we started the sessions in September. Their passing and dribbling skills have come on so much and they are playing well as a team during their mini matches. Year 5s have great team spirit and really encourage each other, which is lovely to see!

Year 6 - Basketball is a firm favourite with Year 6s and it is great to see all the children getting involved and everyone working together as a team. After picking up the sport in Year 5, this group have really embraced the sport and are showing great skills including dribbling, passing and shooting.

Athletics - Congratulations to Leo, Marina and Josie, who competed in an indoor Athletics competition in Worthing on 30th October as part of Crawley Athletics Club. They gave 100% in each event, which included standing long jump, speed bounce, sprint and relay. They showed fantastic Langshott resilience and did themselves and the school proud! Well done!

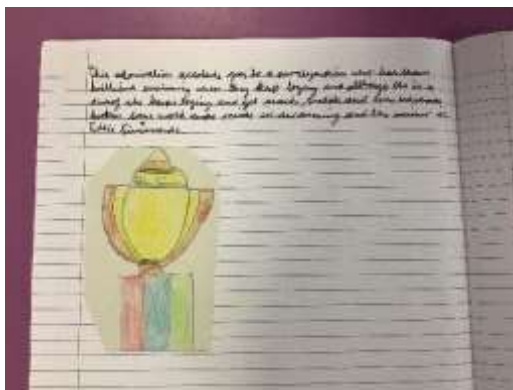
PSHE Week “Celebrating Difference”

Funding Crisis / Cost of Living

I wrote to parents recently about the cost of living crisis, but thought I would re-print it here, just in case anyone did not see it.

As I am sure you are aware, we are experiencing a cost of living crisis. Many of you will be facing difficult financial decisions of your own, with rising energy bills and food prices. The school's budget is also affected by these economic circumstances and our funding has not been increased to cover the additional expense. The recent Autumn Statement outlined £2.3 billion coming to schools - this equates to a 4% rise, however, many of our costs have risen by much more than 4%. Consequently, we must make savings in our budget to avoid a shortfall.

I would like to assure you that our first priority when making these difficult decisions is to provide your child with the best possible education. We will also ensure that our pupils continue to be comfortable, healthy and safe in school.

Unfortunately, the budget cuts will result in the following:

- a) Reallocation of staffing hours to ensure the most cost effective model.
- b) Cancellation of the AstroTurf project - I cannot countenance spending £70,000 on a pitch when we may have to reduce staff hours and cut back on resources.

Please be assured that our governing body and senior leadership team will be working hard to minimise the impact on our pupils and make fair and appropriate decisions.

If you are able, please consider helping us through this challenging time by continuing to supplement the cost of school trips and extra-curricular activities and help our excellent PTA, The Friends of Langshott, in their fundraising endeavours, including the Christmas Fair this Friday.

If you are struggling financially, please make us aware, so we can signpost you to organisations that might be able to help.
