

We started the term with a New Year assembly where I reminded the pupils that January is a good time to look to the future, make some plans and set goals. In another assembly, Mrs Langdale reminded us how we can regulate our emotions, thoughts and feelings using a Zones of Regulation approach. Based around the use of four colours, it helps children selfidentify how they are feeling and categorise it based on

colour, thus helping them to better understand their emotions, sensory needs and thinking patterns. Please ask your child about it.

I am privileged in my job to be able to pop into every classroom regularly. I always come out feeling uplifted by the wonderful things the children are doing. I am able to see first-hand the progress that they are making and how well they are supported by our wonderful staff team. This week I saw our amazing Reception pupils writing their names independently, some writing sentences and others reading a wide range of tricky words and CVC words without

breaking a sweat! This pride in achievement is replicated across the school and our children are always delighted to talk about their learning. On 25<sup>th</sup> January, it was great to see Year 3 having so much fun on their Stone Age Day. They made their own jewellery out of salt dough and learnt about animals such as woolly mammoths. To finish the day, they tried some delicious stone age stew! See page 7.


As always, the children exceeded expectations and their resilience and behaviour was outstanding. Thank you to the parent volunteers that helped on the day - we could not have done it without you.

To top the day off, they even got to try some delicious Stone Age fruit stew while watching a film.









# RE

At Langshott Primary School, we believe that Religious Education gives children and young people in our schools a unique opportunity to reflect on and learn from the faiths and beliefs of those around them.

In Year 1, we have been learning about Islam. As part of our RE curriculum, the children have been finding out about Allah and how Muslims worship him. # **Forest School News**

What a freezing cold start we had to the year outside at Forest School; the children in Year 3, Year 5 and Year 6 were glad of their hats, gloves and extra socks! It was fantastic to see their resilience in the cold weather develop. Year 3's History topic about the Stone Age was brought to life at Forest School this half term. The children experienced what life would have been like for people in the Stone Age (and, due to the weather, it sometimes also felt like the Ice Age) whilst hunter-gathering, collecting fire wood, building settlements and using natural dyes to create cave paintings.



Year 5's Anglo-Saxon and Viking History topic also lent itself perfectly to learning within the woods. They used sticks to write codes in ancient runes, made Anglo-Saxon medallions from clay and learnt the knots needed to make a sword and to build a shelter.

The Year 6 children impressed me a great deal this half term with their continued passion for Forest School and their maturity whilst using tools, including a bow saw to saw wood, a billhook to split wood and a sheath knife to whittle wood. They worked together to make new mallets from logs kindly provided for us, free of charge, by **Heatherlands Tree Care**. (Thanks to Dad of Tommy in Reception for organising this for us.) The mallets the Year 6 children made will be their Forest School legacy that they will leave behind for further generations of Langshott Forest School children to use when building shelters.





During the second half of the Spring term, Year 3 will continue with their Forest School sessions. Year 1 and Year 2 will also return to the woods for more Forest School learning. Look out for a se separate letter with further details. Mrs Shevel, Forest School Leader

Please ensure your child has the correct PE kit and footwear. Earrings and watches must be removed for PE. **PE KIT can be worn on days when sports clubs run after school**.


Trainers can be worn on a Friday for the Langshott lap, but bring shoes in a carrier bag to change into after the lap.
