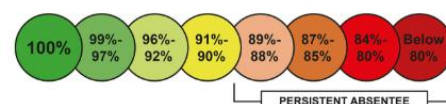

Community Surveys

Parent Survey

Thank you to the 67 parents who responded to our recent Survey. Pleasingly 96% of parents said their child is happy here and would recommend this school to another parent. As those who answered negatively to these questions chose to remain anonymous, I cannot explore with them what their dissatisfaction is, but I invite them to come and talk to me.

Below is a summary of your suggestions for what we could do to improve things:

What you suggest we do	Our response
Improve the number of teacher-led after school clubs	Teacher-led clubs were paused in 2024–25 to allow them time to focus on re-planning lessons following the data loss. Support staff continued to run clubs during this time. After careful consideration, we have decided to prioritise teachers' time for delivering targeted booster sessions and academic interventions. As a result, we do not plan to reintroduce teacher-led clubs at this point in time
Allocate clubs in a fairer way, not first come first served	We advertise in advance when club bookings open, and always release them in the evening to support working families. While we have explored other systems (e.g. ballot-based) the administration required is unfortunately not manageable within current staffing and budget constraints
Improve home learning	We have updated our Home Learning letter for September to clearly explain our rationale and expectations around home learning
Book Look extended to 9.15am	This has already been actioned. The Book Look on 18th July will run from 8.30am to 9.15am. If this works well, we will continue this model into the new academic year
More able writers to be pushed	This focus has been included in our plans for the next academic year
Crystal Club session to 4.30pm at a reduced rate, not just 6pm	We are currently exploring whether this is financially viable
Marvellous Me message each week to say what the children will be learning	We like this suggestion. From September, teachers will send out a weekly brief Marvellous Me message outlining the children's upcoming learning

Pupil Survey

Every class was given dedicated time to complete the pupil survey using the school Chromebooks. Older pupils supported the younger ones by helping them read the questions and navigate the devices. This ensured we received feedback from every year group. 9 out of 420 pupils (2.14%) reported feeling unhappy in school. Teachers have already spoken individually with these pupils to better understand their concerns and explore how we can support them moving forward.

Across the school, the most common suggestion for improvement was to increase the variety of playtime equipment. In response, I have allocated a pot of money to the School Council for September. They will decide what to purchase and lead a discussion on how we can all work together to look after the new resources. Pupils also requested the return of the pop-up pool. I'm pleased to report that it has been booked for summer 2027.

Staff Survey

We are delighted that 100% of the 38 staff who responded to the survey said they are happy working at our school and feel valued and supported. All respondents also said they would recommend our school to a friend, either as a great place to work or to send their child. This is a fantastic endorsement of our school community.

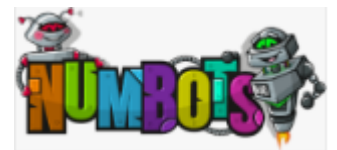

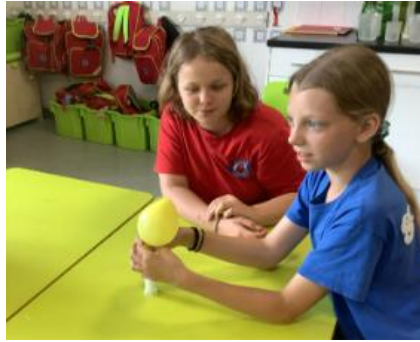

Science Year 5

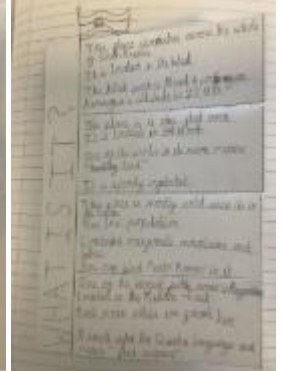

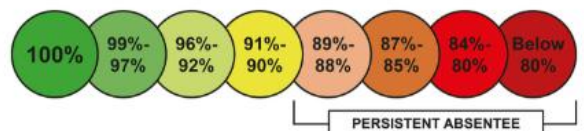

Local Government Reorganisation in Surrey

The government has launched a consultation on Local Government Reorganisation in Surrey. It is open until 5 August and anyone can take part. This consultation is part of the government's devolution plans for transferring more powers from government to local or regional authorities.

Surrey County Council, Elmbridge Borough Council and Mole Valley District Council are recommending that Surrey is arranged into two new unitary councils, East Surrey and West Surrey. These two councils would work with an elected Mayor who would create a new Strategic Authority covering the county of Surrey. This plan is supported by key local partner organisations, including health, police and fire, business and community leaders.

We urge everyone in Surrey to take part in this government consultation to help us build a stronger future for Surrey. Two unitary councils will simplify services, save money and strengthen communities. This is an important opportunity for people to have their say. We encourage school/setting leaders to respond to the consultation and request you share the consultation with staff and parents/carers.
