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From the Headteacher

A new year is always a good time for reflection and resolutions, so our first assembly this term was on the topic of hope and our goals for the future. I shared the story of Harmonie Rose-Allen, age 7, who despite severe disability following meningitis, makes the most of life and has raised thousands of pounds for charity. She is an inspiration to us all because she has never allowed her disability to define her, instead she has used her unique abilities as a catalyst for change — to change attitudes and spread hope. She really embodies our Langshott "Can Do" philosophy.



In week 2, Mrs Langdale reminded us of all the groups we belong to, our class, our year group, our school, club teams, etc., and how lucky we are to feel included and cared for. We then celebrated Chinese New Year with an assembly led by Mrs White. We heard about the Legend of Nian and why the colour red is so important in Chinese culture and then listened to the story of the animal race and how the twelve successful animals



ended up on the Chinese zodiac. This year is the year of the Tiger.



It was a joy to see Year 3 in their Stone Age costumes on 28th January. They went foraging for food in the woods, made salt dough jewellery and sampled Stone Age Stew! See page 15.

We are incredibly proud of Year 6 as they recently undertook their mock SATS with maturity and focus. They have worked extremely hard and made magnificent progress since September. Whilst there is still much work to do, this bodes well for the real tests in May and Secondary School life.

Pupil Rewards

STARS POINTS - It was great to see so many pupils celebrating our STARS Point achievements from last term. Just as a reminder, STARS Points are linked to the school rules, as follows:

S points for **S**elf-control

T points for Taking responsibility

A points for Always following instructions

R points for showing Respect

S points for staying Safe



They are also awarded for being helpful and kind, showing great effort in learning, for using the 4Rs effectively in their learning and for the number of reads they do each week as recorded in their reading record/planner (although this must be signed off by a parent/carer) and TT Rockstars and Numbots.

We will award STARS Points for different things in different year groups, for example, we will might reward for great sitting and listening for our younger children, but not for the older ones, who we expect this as a non-negotiable. Equally, there are some children to whom learning comes more easily than others – thus we reward for EFFORT, remained focussed and exhibited great learning powers.

GOLDEN TICKET FRIDAY LUNCHTIMES -

We are pleased to have reintroduced our Golden Ticket Reward Scheme.

Each week, one child from each class who has been particularly well behaved or helpful at lunchtimes, will be awarded with a Golden Ticket. 



Reception - Maths

This month we have been exploring the concept of more, fewer and subtraction. The children went off and made some games in their choosing time. Harry and George in Sapphire Class made a game where they rolled a dice and had to select the correct amount of Numicon. The child with the highest number won the game!

We also explored 'subitising', this means knowing an amount of objects without having to count. We played a game where if we guess the amount of dots on a fish right – we could feed the fish to a penguin.







Year 1 Maths

We have been learning how to draw tens and ones to help us work out addition and subtraction number sentences in maths this term. The children went outside to practise this. Here are some pictures of Year 1 drawing their tens and ones on whiteboards and with chalk on the playground to work out some subtraction number sentences.





Year 2 Maths

The children in Year 2 have spent the last few weeks learning about time in maths. We kick started our time topic by making our very own clocks, which the children have been using during our maths lessons. They have become proficient at recognising o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to. Year 2 have enjoyed merging topics, using factions to divide a clock face in order to tell the time accurately. We have also rehearsed and perfected our recall of the 5 times table, in order to tell the time with 5 minute intervals.

Reception Science

With the ice that came in January, the children thought of their very own science experiment. They put ice in two buckets and wanted to investigate whether the ice would melt quicker if the bucket had a lid on.

The children have been interested to learn about castles. We went to the school library and found some information books. It was great to learn the names of parts of castles such as drawbridge, moat, turret and battlements. The children then decided to go off and make their own castle with junk modelling materials – the drawbridge was very impressive!











Forest School News

The Year 3 and Year 5 children, as well as a group of Forest School Champions from Year 3 and Year 4, have thoroughly enjoyed their sessions this half term and have shown a particular interest in, and empathy for, the wildlife that frequently visit our Forest School area. We are lucky to have a pair of very tame and curious resident robins who often investigate what the children are up to and will regularly come within a couple of feet of us. As well as this, we have a pair of mallard ducks who are often seen on our Langshott pond; we are hoping to build a duck house and duck board for them to encourage them to stay. Woodpeckers can also often be heard drilling in the trees and sometimes (if we are lucky) a green woodpecker can be seen on the ground close to the wooded area. We also often see a pair of pied wagtails, not to mention the multiple wood pigeons and blue tits. Have a look at the photos below. Can your child identify them all?













As Forest School is primarily a 'child interest driven' area of learning and the children are very keen to increase the amount of wildlife we have in our Forest School area, we would like to start feeding the birds and provide more habitats for invertebrates, amphibians and small mammals. Being mindful of the environment and the importance of reusing rather than buying new where possible, if any families are having a Spring clear out of gardens or sheds, we would gratefully reuse the following items in the Forest School area:



Bird boxes, bird feeders, feeding stations/platforms or bird tables

Bricks and ply wood for children to build bug hotels and hedgehog houses

Computing - Safer Internet Day





We celebrated Safer Internet Day this half term. It is a global campaign to promote the safe and responsible use of technology, which calls on young people, parents, carers, teachers, social workers, law enforcement, companies, policymakers and more, to join together in helping to create a better internet.

Using the internet safely and positively is a key message that we promote at Langshott and celebrating Safer Internet Day is a great opportunity for us to re-emphasise the online safety messages we deliver throughout the year. Some of the activities we will be participating in on the day include: Identifying rules that keep us safe and healthy when using technology; thinking about the trusted adults we can speak to if something happens to make us feel sad, frightened, uncomfortable or worried; ways that we can show respect and kindness online; understanding why passwords are important, and why we should always ask a trusted adult before sharing any personal information online. Many of the activities will be based around the themes covered in the story of 'Digiduck and the Magic Castle'. This is the latest in a series of books from Childnet International.

Year 1 Computing

During Online Safety week the children discussed how to stay safe online. Some of the scenarios that we discussed included, asking a trusted grown up before playing a game online and sending an email to a family member.



Year 2 Computing

During 'Online Safety Week', the children in Year 2 learnt about online relationships, online reputation, online bullying and managing online information. Many of our discussions were centred around recognising trusted adults and the impact of the internet on our everyday lives. One activity included talking about the importance of asking 'permission'

before using technology. The children thought carefully about who their **trusted adults** were and who they could ask for permission from. They discussed why it is important to



ask permission before using any technology (i.e. before sending messages, using the internet and playing games online). Each class then created a web of support using string! Every time the ball of string was thrown to a child, they had to name a trusted adult.



News from the English & Creative Arts Faculty

Reception - English

This term we are exploring the world of 'Make Believe' and using our imaginations to explore fairy tales, superheroes, mythical creatures and pirates! We started the term with one our favourite stories Superworm! The children have been using their creative skills to make worms with straws, card and googly eyes. We also had some worms and mud outside in a tuff spot – this was great fun and the children began to notice that some worms were longer than others. Another of one our favourite superhero stories was 'Supertato'! The 'Evil Pea' from the story snuck into Reception and taped carrots to our smartboards he even strung up a butternut squash! Take a look at some of the amazing Wanted posters below. The writing was incredible, so some children were awarded with a special pencil. Some children even decided to design their own superhero during choosing time. Supertato saves the other vegetables in the story, so the children thought of some activities they wanted to do involving vegetables. We made Supertato with real potatoes and made a vegetable soup – yummy!

















Year 1



Year 4 Reading


During one of our experience days in English, we decided to build a den to read in! The children had a great time enjoying a good book.







The Lion Above the Door - This is a beautiful story offering a different perspective on learning about WWII.




Music - Composer of the Month

Welcome back to another segment of 'Composer of the Month'. The whole school has been learning about the life and work of: **Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart**

We have been listening to his music during assemblies and in the classroom. Here are some interesting facts about his wonderful journey:

- Mozart was born in Salzburg, Austria on January 27 1756.
- Mozart became known as a child prodigy because he was a very gifted composer and musician.
- He composed his first piece of music at the age of five and his first opera at the age of twelve.
- At the age of six he was an accomplished pianist and violinist.
- He had an incredible memory and only had to listen to a piece of music once before writing down the very notes that he had heard.
- Mozart died in 1791, aged 35.
- Exactly 250 years after his birth, bells were rung in his birth place. There is a monument dedicated to Mozart in Salzburg and an annual music festival is held in his honour.





News from the Global Understanding & Awareness Faculty

Year 1 History

Year 1 loved learning about the History of Transport this term! We enjoyed sorting vehicles into 'old' and 'modern' categories and comparing these to each other. The children formed some fantastic sentences to compare the similarities and differences. We learnt about significant engineers from the past (George Stephenson and The Wright Brothers) and how they impacted the travel and transport of modern day life. The children then created a timeline of how transport have developed over time.










Year 1 Geography

After learning about how transport has changed over time, we took the children on a local walk to Horley bridge so that the children could see some modern day trains.



We got lots of waves from the train conductors and the children loved walking in the local area. This walk supported the children to draw their own maps from an aerial viewpoint.



Year 3 Stone Age Day

Year 3 have been learning history outside the classroom recently, starting their new topic - The Stone Age. They gathered together as Early people to engage in historical rituals! They learnt about hunters and gatherers and have been foraging for their own food and hunting animals to survive, pretending to be The Early Man. The children designed and made their own stone age jewellery - bone necklaces that links to our DT topic. As well as this, they ate some delicious stone age stew made from foraged fruits and did some stone age crafts. To top off the day, we

Year 5 History & DT Home Learning

The incredible Year 5 children have been really busy at home creating their Anglo-Saxon settlements and houses. PE

<u>Year 1</u> - Ruby and Topaz have loved their multi-skills PE sessions this term as they have had a chance to try a variety of skills, such as bouncing and shooting into the basketball nets, rolling balls into small targets plus catching and throwing. Having such a variety of activities to practise means everyone is feeling successful and positive at the end of a session!

Year 2 - It has been a joy to teach the children from Onyx and Diamond class some gymnastic moves and shapes this term. They have learned so much about what makes a quality balance and a good gymnastic shape and they have even started to link shapes and balances together with a partner. The children are extremely skilled and have demonstrated many of our learning powers during each lesson. It has been wonderful to watch the them inspire each other and grow in confidence.









<u>Year 3</u> - I have been so impressed at how quickly Year 3 have picked up hockey skills this term. They are really getting the hang of dribbling and keeping control of the ball and are now starting to understand how to pass accurately and 'trapping' the ball. They are showing real resilience in what can be quite a tricky sport to master!

<u>Year 4</u> - The children from Year 4 are showing such enthusiasm for hockey and have really developed their dribbling and passing skills, as well as their knowledge of the game. We have just started to play some 2 vs 2 games as I know the children are very keen to play some mini matches, which we will play after half term!

<u>Year 5</u> - It has been a pleasure to teach the Year 5s badminton this term and it is fair to say it is a firm favourite with lots of them! They have picked up the skills really well and, with a bit more practise, they will start to nail the underarm serve and 'chasse' step to help them return the shots to their partners. In other lessons they have enjoyed gymnastics, showing off their climbing, jumping and balancing skills, as the photos show.









<u>Year 6</u> - Lucky Year 6s have two PE sessions a week with Miss Boardman. In one session we are focussing on badminton and, having already learned the basics in Year 5, they are beginning to think tactically about which shot to play to win a point.
