
News from the STEM Faculty

Year 1 Maths

We have been learning about measurement this term, exploring different ways that we can measure length, height and weight using a variety of equipment. The children loved measuring everyday objects around the school, but before doing this, they made sure to estimate! They have worked hard to measure accurately, compare objects and decide which piece of measuring equipment would be most suitable to measure their chosen item.















Year 2 Maths

The children in Year 2 have thoroughly enjoyed our measurement topic in maths. They have relished all of the practical opportunities and have worked closely as a team. They recapped their knowledge of weight/mass, measuring with balance scales and digital scales. They made fantastic estimations about the weight of objects and recorded their answers using **g** and **kg**.





Measurement continued....







The children had the opportunity to explore volume and capacity They used their understanding of 2s, 5s and 10s to determine the scale on each container and learnt to count the division lines accurately. They developed their knowledge of **ml** and **l** and were fascinated when they found out that **1000ml = 1l**.

Reception

In Reception we have been exploring lots shape, space and measure activities. We looked at cylinders, cubes, cuboids, cones and pyramids and discovered these shapes are made from 2D shapes. For example, in the junk modelling area we noticed that cubes are made out of squares. We even made an obstacle course with 3D shapes.

Jack from Jack and the Beanstalk then left us some bean seeds which we have planted – the children have been ordering beanstalks by height from shortest to tallest and tallest to shortest. We then discovered that all the children in Reception are different heights – we had great fun ordering each other by height.

As part of our "Make Believe" topic we have been thinking about the materials from the traditional story "The Three Little Pigs". We used scales to find out which was heaviest and lightest out of straw, sticks and bricks. This led on to us weighing Numicon – the children have really enjoyed making the scales balance by weighing the same amount of Numicon each side.

Also this term, Reception have thoroughly enjoyed Forest School. It has been so wonderful to see children's resilience and confidence grow as they explore, take risk, discover and imagine through various natural experiences.

British Science Week at Langshott

In March, we celebrated British Science Week on the theme of growth. We launched our week with a special assembly and completed our home learning to develop a passion for science. Around the school, lots of science learning was taking place, making this a wonderful opportunity for the children to celebrate science!

Year 1 Science

After writing their very own fact file about seeds, the children were inspired to plant their own cress and sunflower seeds. They were able to observe how quickly cress grows and make sure to keep it alive by watering it regularly. A fact that they found very interesting is that cress seeds can be grown in cotton wool. Lots of children included this in their fact file. Some of the sunflower seeds have started to shoot, and the children are looking to seeing which sunflower grows the tallest. They are looking forward to using rulers, and hopefully metre sticks to measure the height of their sunflowers!



Year 2 Science

As part of Science week, the children in Year 2 learnt about how seeds germinate and grow, the life cycle of a bean plant and finally they planted a seed. The plants are now part of an investigation and the children are testing to see which conditions they grow best in, e.g. sunlight and no water, water and no sunlight, sunlight and water, etc. The children have made their predictions and are excited to find out the results of their experiment.







Year 5 Science

In Year 5, we learnt about *Living things and their habitats* and learnt a lot about different lifecycles. Did you know that there are three different types of mammals (whose young develop in different ways): placentals, monotremes and marsupials! Following this, Year 5 learnt more about plants and their life cycles. We used our working scientifically skills to closely dissect lily flowers to observe and identify different parts and their purposes. Using our sketching skills, we created observational drawings of lilies and labelled these.







Year 3 Science

In Year 3, we have been learning all about our bodies. We have looked at food labels to explore different types of nutrients, learnt about the different types of skeletons, as well as all of the bones in our bodies. To finish our science learning, we created our own skeleton models, using cotton buds for bones. Here you can see some of Amber class with their pictures.







Year 4 Science

As part of our Science week, we were looking at growth. In Year 4, we specifically looked at living things and their habitats. We spent time understanding different types of animals and how they are grouped. We managed to work our way through some classification keys and as a result we created our own! Our favourite part of the week had to be going into the woods and searching for invertebrates.





Year 6 Science

Year 6 spent time classifying animals and plants into groups based on their common characteristics. We found out about the work of Carl Linnaeus and even created our own curious creatures for classification. We learnt about microorganisms such as bacteria, viruses and fungi and then we planned and carried out a 'mouldy bread' investigation to find out what conditions microorganisms need to grow.



Forest School News

This half term, Reception and Year 1 children have very much enjoyed their Forest School adventures and witnessed our first ever Langshott Forest School Spring! As part of managing the new site in September, we cleared an area of

thickly overgrown brambles, ensuring we left enough nettles to encourage butterflies to lay their eggs in the summer term. This bramble clearance has given the bulbs waiting beneath the surface a chance to awaken and we were greeted after the February half term holiday by a host of golden daffodils. A group of Year 1 children decided to use this as a setting for an 'enchanted fairy playground' – what great imaginations!



The Year 3 and 4 Forest School champions group have also been busy out in the Forest School area this half term too. Here are the Year 3 champions who worked together to use natural and recycled materials to make a hedgehog and invertebrate hotel next to our Langshott log pile. It was lovely to see them learning about conservation and construction in



the sunshine.

We would also like to say a HUGE thank you to our very own 'handy Andy'; our helpful Forest School man that can!

He has made and installed bird feeders, bird boxes, robin boxes, a duck house and invertebrate homes, as well as preparing the flower beds ready for all the children to plant their fruit and vegetables in.

Year 1 Forest School

What an amazing experience the children in Year 1 have had this term at Forest School! Our sessions have consisted of tyre swing rides, cooking in the mud kitchen, receiving wishing stones, making fires and eating marshmallows. The children have absolutely loved getting muddy and learning in the natural environment. Thank you Mrs Shevel for creating lasting memories that the children will treasure.









Computing

5 Action for Setting Parental Controls

- **1.** Set up home broadband parental controls and make use of controls on your home broadband.
- **2.** Set controls on your search engine; encourage your child to always use child-friendly search engines and activate and lock the safe search settings on the browsers and platforms they use.
- **3.** Use privacy settings on apps and devices; activate the safety measures offered by different sites. Social networking sites like Facebook have privacy settings that will help prevent your child from sharing too much personal information or from seeing unsuitable advertising.









- **4.** Block pop-ups. If you are worried about your children accessing inappropriate content though accidentally clicking on adverts in pop-ups, follow the advice from Tech Advisor on how to stop these.
- **5.** Have open conversations with your child about online safety and reassure them that they can talk to you or a trusted adult whenever they need to. By talking to your child about their interests you can help them find suitable sites to visit and apps to use. Review these sites as they get older.

How to Keep your Child Safe Online

- Have conversations about online safety little and often.
- Take an interest in which sites they visit and who they talk to.
- Warn your child that strangers can pop up anywhere online: email, instant messenger, social networking sites or online games.
- Your child may feel they know someone well, so remember to talk to them about what they should not share with people they have only met online.
- Discuss boundaries and say you would like to be friends on social networks, initially so you can monitor their content.
- Ensure that your child knows to ask for advice if someone online act inappropriately, how to report abuse and how to block people.
- Check the privacy settings on social media and websites. Adjust parental controls to suit your child's age and maturity.

Please remember that we do hold Children and Technology meetings throughout the school year. These are to inform parents of the dangers that can happen online, as well as support and guide you to keep your child/ren safe.


News from the English & Creative Arts Faculty

Welcome back to another segment of 'Composer of the month'. The whole school has been learning about the life and work of: George Frideric Handel.

We have been listening to his music during assemblies and in the classroom. Here are some interesting facts about his wonderful journey:

- He was born on 23rd February 1685 in North Germany in the province of Saxony.
- He was a famous German Baroque composer who wrote 42 operas.
- Handel's father did not approve of his love of music and wanted him to be a lawyer.
- His aunt gave him a harpsichord for his 7th birthday.
- In 1703, he moved to Hamburg and became a violinist and harpsichordist at the opera house.
- From 1710, Handel lived in London and eventually became the Master of the Orchestra at the Royal Academy of Music.
- He completed his most famous work, Messiah, in 1740.
- He died on 14th April 1759 and was buried in Westminster Abbey.




English - World Book Day 2022

Year 1 Writing








Year 5 Recorders

News from the Global Understanding & Awareness Faculty

Through engaging and memorable learning experiences - which celebrate the ever changing, complex and diverse world in which we live - we believe that we can help to encourage and enable the future generation to thrive.

Year 1 RE

Year 1 have been learning more about Christianity and The Easter Story. As we read the story, we paused to imagine feelings and emotions associated with the significant events. The children were able to sequence these events in order in their groups. We then discussed the significance of the crucifix to Christians, before having the chance to sample a hot cross bun. The children then used their imagination to design their own food incorporating the cross to portray the significance of this Christian symbol.



Year 2 RE









The children in Year 2 started **RE Week** by studying the Easter Story and reminding themselves of the key points. They talked about how Christians believe that Jesus's death meant that they can put things right with God again (and be forgiven). The children discussed if they thought the story was **happy** or **sad** and agreed that although it is sad as Jesus was killed, it is happy as he forgave those who hurt him. They learnt that for Christians, Jesus's resurrection means death is not the end.



To round off **RE Week** the children made their own Easter Gardens. They went on a nature hunt around the school to collect stones, moss and twigs. They discussed the different elements of an Easter Garden and what each part represents: Jesus's tomb, his resurrection and new life.

Year 4 RE In Year 4, we studied Lent. We learnt that it is all about giving up things that we enjoy. As part of the learning, we decided on 40 different random acts of kindness – one for each day of Lent.

Year 5 RE

Our Year 5 RE topic this term was *How do Christians know what happened at Easter?* To find this out, we looked at four Gospel accounts and learnt about Jesus' resurrection. We then compared the four accounts to find similarities and differences. Finally, Year 5 enjoyed researching and preparing a debate on the topic: The account of Luke is more informative and accurate than the account of Matthew. We enjoyed this opportunity to share our findings and debate our ideas.





Year 6 RE

<u>Year 6 Easter RE Topic – Did Jesus have to die?</u>

After revising the Easter story, our main themes were sacrifice and atonement and we had some fantastic discussions in class. Our final outcome was to produce a piece of art based on these themes. The children produced some really thoughtful and beautiful pieces.

On Wednesday 23rd February, Year 4 went on an exciting adventure! We visited a place called Juniper Hall. We stayed there for 2 nights and 3 days. When we arrived, we had a picnic lunch out the front before we went on a long hike up Box Hill. We experienced lots of adventures on our residential and learnt how to use a compass. We really enjoyed going in the river and racing ducks. When we got back we created an amazing assembly that we showed to our parents telling them all about what we had done.


